Logline

Dictatorial government commits Genocide against spiritual practice, with effects spreading worldwide.

Short Synopsis

Survivors of slave labour, brainwashing, torture and attempted organ harvesting combine with an investigative journalist, and eminent experts, to discuss Genocide of Falun Gong practitioners in modern-day China, a contentious subject that increasingly involves the West.

Medium Synopsis

Transmission 6-10 glitches in, with statistics of Chinese Communist Party political campaigns, 1949-1989.

2007; the Beijing Olympic Games draw closer. Those who want to see change in China, champion an undisclosed controversy beginning in 1999, when Falun Gong is outlawed. The spiritual practice is introduced and initial understandings of why it is banned. Eminent researchers and an investigative journalist combine to deliberate on the facts, whilst information screens narrate the story.

The CCP label the group an 'evil cult' via State-run propaganda. Thousands peacefully protest and are sentenced to jail, without trial. Western practitioners aid their cause, but are arrested, beaten, deported and placed on a growing 'blacklist'. Mainland Chinese survivors speak of torture. The West watches as political psychiatric abuse resurfaces. The label 'cult' is debated. Propaganda proliferates. Five people self-immolate in Tiananmen Square. Perceptions change; a 'death quota' permitted. Practitioners don't quit. Pirate broadcasts disclose the truth. 5000 are rounded up in retaliation. Experiences of brainwashing and slave labour are recalled; the scale of the situation becomes clear.

An extra-legal Gestapo-like organisation (6-10 Office) controls and manipulates all. The process of 'Transformation' is divulged. China's global influence is explored; the persecution spreads overseas. Western corporations assist a sophisticated spy network, which the 'Iceland Incident' reflects. Evidence of organ harvesting emerges.

A Mainland lawyer is tortured for speaking out on a 21st century Holocaust. Practitioners never give up their campaign for freedom. The Human Rights Torch Relay concludes opinions with shocking statistics and a message to 'inform others'.

Long Synopsis

Transmission 6-10 glitches in.

A series of historical information screens set the scene, leading to the present day Human Rights Torch Relay, London.

Former Vice President of European Parliament Edward McMillan-Scott, Lord Avebury and former Olympians talk on the tannoy about China holding the Games. However, the police interrupt the event, to reveal something key to the story.

Former Chinese communist party member Chen Yonglin explains that the CCP has been very successful at overseas propaganda to convince the world it is turning to democracy.

Jiang Zemin's 'three orders' in the ban of Falun Gong are introduced.

Falun Gong practitioner Jeff Priore describes what the practice is, from his own understandings.

An article condemning Falun Gong is published in Tianjin in 1999. A peaceful demonstration follows, and forty-five practitioners are arrested.

Ethan Gutmann, the main interviewee is introduced. Along with journalist Jonathan Mirsky, Chen Yonglin and former Canadian Secretary of State David Kilgour, he begins to discuss the 20th July demonstration at Zhongnanhai, and the subsequent ban.

Practitioner He Bin talks about his personal experiences of the ban.

The CCP redefine Falun Gong as a 'cult'.

The 'battle of Tiananmen' begins. He Bin talks about going to peacefully demonstrate, and of his arrest and police interrogation with electric shock batons and beatings.

Western practitioners turn up in Tiananmen Square to demonstrate.

Former US neuroscientist Charles Lee introduces himself and why he started to practice.

The ban creates a conflict of interest between party members who practice Falun Gong.

Charles explains his returning to China, leading into discussing psychiatric abuse with eminent researcher Robin Munro.

Ethan introduces his own worldwide investigation.

Resistance under detention is discussed with Jiao Ming's case.

He Bin discusses his abstention from food under imprisonment, and the resultant force-feeding he experienced.

Professor of Religion Dr Chan Shun Hing and the Honourable Albert Ho discuss the labelling of Falun Gong as an evil cult.

Annie Yang is introduced, as she discusses her arrest from her home, and her torture.

Dr Herman Salton, expert of international law and relations, discusses the nature of the CCP from his perspective.

Ethan discusses Falun Gong spreading through all layers of society, and returning them to traditional values.

Charles discusses the state control of media in China, and of the resultant propaganda against Falun Gong

The worst incident of state propaganda, the Tiananmen Square self-immolation, is deconstructed with David Kilgour, Ethan and Professor of Journalism To Yiu Ming.

Practitioners undertake counter-propaganda transmission efforts, with tapping into TV broadcasts. This leads to one of the biggest round-ups in Chinese history.

Whether Falun Gong is political or not is discussed.

Charles Lee talks about his plan to tap into a TV network with counter-propaganda, and his subsequent arrest.

He Bin and Charles discuss their experiences of brainwashing, labour camps, torture, forced labour and condemnation sessions.

Charles is released, and talks about the number of recorded deaths so far, finally hinting at organ harvesting. 'There is no record of the nameless'.

The story shifts back in time to the 1989 Tiananmen Square Massacre opening up China. A revival of qigong ensues, and Falun Gong begins to be recognised and praised inside and outside China.

Ethan re-treads our story with the banning of Falun Gong books in 1995, and of the confessions of a former finance minister.

Zek Halu, spokesperson for the CIPFG, discusses Communism being an import from the West into China.

Tianjin and Zhongnanhai are then revealed to have been manipulated and a set-up the by 6-10 Office.

Researcher and UN advisor Sarah Cook discusses the 6-10 Office; an extra-legal task force set up to persecute Falun Gong, likened to the Gestapo of Nazi Germany.

The idea of transformation under detention is discussed, with practitioners forced to write a statement denouncing Falun Gong in order to be released. However, the consequences are not as promised.

The cult label is re-addressed as first originating from Western media.

Chen Yonglin reveals himself as a former minister of foreign affairs in Sydney, working in overseas propaganda and spying as part of the 6-10 system.

Western corporations are revealed to have facilitated the persecution by creating monitoring systems for the CCP.

Jonathan Mirsky discusses his experiences being involved in talks after 1989, and that human rights not been tackled in China, introducing the idea of 'China Magic'.

Researcher Dr Herman Salton discusses the Iceland incident. Jiang Zemin arrives, and Falun Gong practitioners are denied entry into Iceland. Protestors on a black list are blocked at airports. Racial profiling is put in place, and those entering the country are arrested. The origin of the blacklist is debated. A media leak sparks public protests, and Haflidi Helgasson, Editor of Business News, discusses why.

The relationship between China and the West is discussed.

To Yiu Ming describes the manipulation of media. Ethan discusses why the press aren't reporting on the persecution, and of human rights organizations stance.

Sarah Cook, co-editor of Gao Zhisheng's autobiography, introduces this human rights lawyer and his personal fact finding missions inside China, in addition to his aiding of the UN Special Rapporteur on Torture.

Gao Zhisheng is arrested and tortured, as evidence of organ harvesting grows.

David Kilgour, co-author of the investigation into allegations of organ harvesting, presents his findings at a conference, with

Professor Tom Treasure, eminent cardio-thoracic surgeon, discussing its likeness to the Holocaust.

At a telephone conference with Hu Jia, well-known human rights defender, Edward McMillan-Scott re-introduces the discussion of the Olympic Games, and likens them to the Genocide Games of Nazi Germany.

The organ harvesting conference closes. The story of Gao ends with his last known sighting. The Human Rights Torch Relay closes.

Ethan discusses the efforts of practitioners. Jeff Priore brings closure with his personal experiences of working to raise awareness of the persecution in Hong Kong.

Voices of support from Haflidi, Dr Chan and Jonathan Mirsky lead to Chen Yonglin and his final thought.

The statistics of the persecution are revealed, and the transmission starts again, this time at full strength.
